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Enjoy your group and be enjoyed in your group

Listen.

Lean in and hear what others are saying at your table. Ask questions. Silence your cell phone and even put it away unless you must be available for a child or an important call. Be sure not to dominate the sharing time. When someone shares let it be about them. Resist the urge to make it about you (i.e. “the same thing happened to me in 1998 and I . . .”). Be aware of those who are quiet and invite their input.



Protect One Another.

We’re a bit like Vegas in that what is shared at the table, stays at the table. Make this a safe place for everyone. Other than that, we’re not like Vegas at all.

No Advice or Counseling.

Resist the urge to give advice—this can often be very hurtful. We’re not here to *fix* one another but to support, care and point one another to the grace and truth of Jesus. Also resist the urge to tell someone in pain that “it will get better.” Typically, in the midst of great pain, a person wants simply to be heard. Affirm that what they are experiencing must be hard and then just listen.



Pray. Pray. Pray.

Pray for your group throughout the week and invite others to pray for you as you participate.



Prepare.

Get the most out of this study by using this study guide. Please make every effort to do the homework and come prepared for discussion. This will bless everyone, including you! Feel free to divide each lesson into smaller segments that you do 2-3 times a week rather than trying to do it all in one sitting.

Your Kids

An Introduction to Ephesians

Ephesians is a grand and sweeping letter written by Paul from a prison cell. Most likely it traveled to many different churches near Ephesus. It's a letter to churches about being the church.

In this letter, Paul tells us that the church is a gathering of people who look different than they once did. They are a community transformed by blessing and grace and the power of God. And because they are transformed they live differently — in their relationships with God, family, bosses, evil forces, and one another.



Ephesians is a book of worship and prayer. The introduction from verse 3 to verse 14 is one long sentence proclaiming the amazing work of God who has lavished his love on us. Twice Paul stops and breaks into prayers that express gratitude, truth and worship. Paul rejoices in Christ in us as well as hope, glory, power, love, the fullness of God, and the beauty of Jesus.

Worship fills the book of Ephesians. But it is also a very practical book. Want to know why it matters to be a Christian and in relationship with Jesus? Read Ephesians 1:3-14. Want to know how to have a life today and for all eternity with God? Read Ephesians 2:1-10. Are you struggling with a God who seems so exclusive? Read Ephesians 2:11-22. Does Church seem like a waste of time and merely a legalistic ritual? Find out the purpose of the church in Ephesians 3:1-13.



Do you desire to know who you are? Who you really are — not what others have told you, not the box you feel trapped in, not the negative messages that bombard your mind — but to know the identity your creator gives you? Read Ephesians 1-3 and discover that you are blessed beyond measure, chosen by God, marked as God's possession, alive in Christ, a participant in a new humanity, a part of God's plan and deeply loved.

Using this Study Guide

The following page will explain the structure of this study. Note that at the end of each chapter is a section called **Going Deeper**. The **Going Deeper** section is optional, but do take a look at it. If you only do part of this section, do the Scripture Memory part. Each week a verse is given for you to commit to memory. Scripture memory is one of the most practical practices of the Christian life. It puts God's word in your mind and heart for easy access when you need a reminder of his truth and grace and wisdom to live life with others.

Ephesus was a huge city filled with industry, the arts, a massive library and idol worship. These are pictures from Ephesus today. The library (top); Christian etchings in the sidewalks from the time of Paul. These etchings often marked the location of Christian gatherings (middle); The goddess Artemis who was widely worshiped at the time (bottom).

{How to} S.O.A.P

Scripture • Observation • Application • Prayer

S.O.A.P is a simple method of studying the Bible. We'll use this method throughout our study of Ephesians. The four key elements are: Scripture, Observation, Application and Prayer. Here is a description of each step:

Scripture

- **Read it**—The first step is to read the assigned passage of Scripture (it's often helpful to read the verses before and after the passage to gain context).
- **Write it out**—Sometimes it helps to write the passage out in a way that helps us see it clearly. We'll do this each week in the study. Here's an example:

Hebrews 12:1-2a "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith."

Hebrews 12:1-2a Re-written to better see connections, repeated words and themes:

Therefore,
since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses,
let us throw off everything that hinders
and the sin that so easily entangles.
And let us run with perseverance
the race marked out for us,
fixing our eyes on Jesus,
the pioneer and
perfecter of our faith."

- **Re-write it and personalize it** —It can also help to re-write the passage in your own words and in a way that makes it personal. Here's an example of **Hebrews 12:1-2a**:

"Because I'm surrounded by all these amazing people of faith who gave testimony to the goodness of God (ch. 11) I will throw off everything that is hindering me for following God (fear, the distraction of social media, lack of discipline) and the sin that has me tangled up (envy, unforgiveness, pride, gossip, lying). I will run with perseverance, not giving up when it feels hard, doing the right thing when the wrong thing is easier. I will fix my eyes on Jesus because he is committed to my faith and he will perfect it. I will fix my eyes on him through worship each day.

Observation

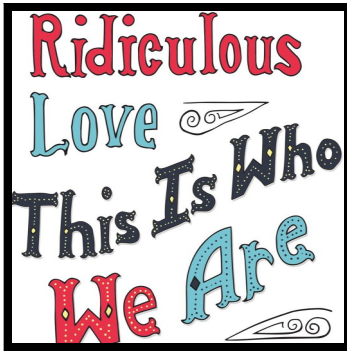
- **Ask Questions of the passage:** Who, what, where, when, why and how are great questions to ask.
- **Key Words**— Record the key words, repeating words and phrases that seem to jump off the page into your heart and mind. Be sure to look up their definitions in dictionaries, commentaries (<http://www.studylight.org/com>) and lexicons (www.biblehub.com).
- **Cross-References** — Many Bibles have cross-references that lead you to other passages of Scripture to help you better reflect on what you are reading. These usually appear as little numbers next to a word. You can also find these when you read a passage at www.biblegateway.com.

Application

- **Apply the passage to your life and heart** — ideally this is something you can do within 48 hours of your study.
- **Ask:** Is there an action I can take? Is there a change I can make? Is there a truth I can memorize?

Prayer

- **Pray the Scripture** — Use the passage as a guide for your time of prayer.
- **Write it out** — Write your prayer in your journal. Writing our prayers can help us slow down and make space to listen to God.
- **Pray** — does this passage point you to adoration of God? Confession of sin? Thanksgiving? Requests? Pray them all!



Week One: We are Blessed in Christ

Ephesians is a book about the Church (all who are in Christ), who we are and how we live. This first week is an introduction to the book and to our identity in Christ. You can find **Ephesians 1-3** on page 43 of this study guide. First enjoy the teaching. Then enjoy the time in your group. Lean into all that God wants to show you about who you are and why you exist.

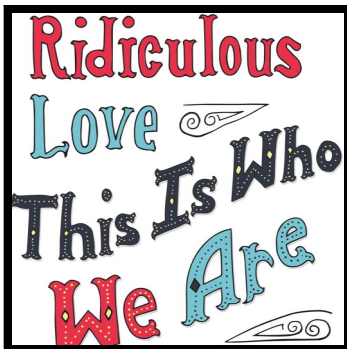

Week Two: We are Chosen

It is no small thing to be chosen by God. Especially when we consider that the story of mankind begins with people choosing against God — choosing not to trust his words or his ways (**Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-24; Romans 1:20-23; Romans 3:11, 23-24**). People run from God and they keep running from God but he always runs toward people, lavishing his love upon them (**Luke 15; Romans 5:8; John 3:16-17**). Paul starts the book of Ephesians with a song of worship, proclaiming who God is and what he has done for us by choosing us to be his. **Ephesians 1:3-14** is actually one long sentence of exaltation.



S.O.A.P

S.O.A.P is a way to study the Bible that involves **Scripture, Observation, Application** and **Prayer**. This is the outline we'll use throughout this study. See page 4 for a detailed explanation of S.O.A.P.

Application

Apply it to Your Heart: How will you live differently knowing that God has chosen you?

Apply it to Your Relationships: In light of the love and grace God has lavished on you in choosing you to be his possession, who can you lavish love upon in the next 48 hours? What will you do to show this love?

Apply it to Your Everyday: Throughout this passage Paul repeats the idea that we are chosen and blessed “for the praise of his glory.” What will it look like for you to live to the praise of God’s glory this week?

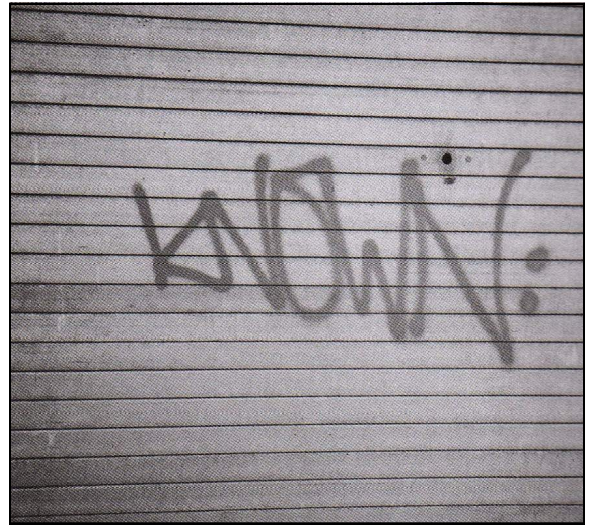

Going Deeper: We are Chosen

Memorize: One of the most helpful practices in the Christian life is Scripture Memory. Each week we encourage you to memorize a verses (or verses) from the passage studied. Here are the verses for this week.

Ephesians 1:4-5

For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love ⁵he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will—

Mix it Up: Read **Ephesians 1:3-14** in The Message version of the Bible. Record what stands out below.

How blessed is God! And what a blessing he is!

He's the Father of our Master, Jesus Christ, and takes us to the high places of blessing in him.

Long before he laid down earth's foundations, he had us in mind, had settled on us as the focus of his love, to be made whole and holy by his love. Long, long ago he decided to adopt us into his family through Jesus Christ. (What pleasure he took in planning this!) He wanted us to enter into the celebration of his lavish gift-giving by the hand of his beloved Son.

Because of the sacrifice of the Messiah, his blood poured out on the altar of the Cross, we're a free people—free of penalties and punishments chalked up by all our misdeeds. And not just barely free, either. Abundantly free!

He thought of everything, provided for everything we could possibly need, letting us in on the plans he took such delight in making. He set it all out before us in Christ, a long-range plan in which everything would be brought together and summed up in him, everything in deepest heaven, everything on planet earth.

It's in Christ that we find out who we are and what we are living for.

Long before we first heard of Christ and got our hopes up, he had his eye on us, had designs on us for glorious living, part of the overall purpose he is working out in everything and everyone. It's in Christ that you, once you heard the truth and believed it (this Message of your salvation), found yourselves home free—signed, sealed, and delivered by the Holy Spirit. This signet from God is the first installment on what's coming, a reminder that we'll get everything God has planned for us, a praising and glorious life.

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Week Three: We are His Possession

Last week we discovered that we are chosen by God and that he adopted us into a relationship with him that is grounded in his lavish love and grace. This week we continue to discover what it means to be marked as his possession and empowered by the same power that raised Christ from the dead.

Before you dive into this time of meditation and study, pause to pray that God will speak to you by his Spirit for your good and his glory.

Going Deeper: We are Marked as His Possession

Memorize: Dallas Willard said, “Bible memorization is absolutely fundamental to spiritual formation. If I had to choose between all the disciplines of the spiritual life, I would choose Bible memorization, because it is a fundamental way of filling our mind with what it needs.”

Ephesians 1:13-14

¹³ And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴ who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God’s possession—to the praise of his glory.

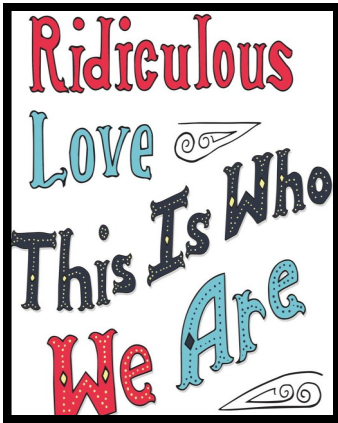

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Week Four: We are Alive

We are chosen by God and we are his possession. Throughout **Ephesians 1**, Paul is proclaiming the goodness of God to us! Remember the first 14 verses are actually one long sentence of praise to God for what he has done for all who belong to him. In **Ephesians 2:1-10** Paul continues in worship of God. He tells us who we were and who we now are in Christ. This is one of those passages in which a true understanding of the severity of sin helps us embrace the stunning gravity of grace. This is also one of the clearest passages about how one comes into relationship with God by grace rather than religious striving or moral purity. This passage reminds us that everything is grace — our salvation and our sanctification (becoming more like Christ).

<p>Galatians 1:6-7, 11-12 ⁶I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you to live in the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel— ⁷which is really no gospel at all. Evidently some people are throwing you into confusion and are trying to pervert the gospel of Christ ¹¹ . . . the gospel I preached is not of human origin. ¹²I did not receive it from any man, nor was I taught it; rather, I received it by revelation from Jesus Christ.</p>	
<p>Ephesians 2:4-10 ⁴But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, ⁵made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved. ⁶And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, ⁷in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. ⁸For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God— ⁹not by works, so that no one can boast. ¹⁰For we are God’s handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.</p>	
<p>2 Timothy 1:8-10 ⁸So do not be ashamed of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner. Rather, join with me in suffering for the gospel, by the power of God. ⁹He has saved us and called us to a holy life—not because of anything we have done but because of his own purpose and grace. This grace was given us in Christ Jesus before the beginning of time, ¹⁰but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior, Christ Jesus, who has destroyed death and has brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.</p>	

A DEFINITION OF GRACE

Undeserved acceptance and love received from another. An undeserved favor granted by a superior to an inferior. When used of divine grace toward mankind, it refers to the undeserved favor of God in providing salvation for those deserving condemnation.

To be favorable or merciful. It refers to the kind turning of either God or humans to persons in an act of assistance in time of need (Prov. 14:3; Ps. 4:1). Grace is found in the Old and New Testament

Application

1. Apply it to Your Everyday: In **Ephesians 2:5** Paul declares that we are now “alive” in Christ. Look over the following cross-reference passages and answer the application question below.

We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like his. For we know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body ruled by sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin—because anyone who has died has been set free from sin. Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. For we know that since Christ was raised from the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him. The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God.

Memorize: Chuck Swindoll said, "I know of no other single practice in the Christian life more rewarding, practically speaking, than memorizing Scripture. . . . No other single exercise pays greater spiritual dividends! Your prayer life will be strengthened. Sharing your faith will be sharper and much more effective. Your attitudes and outlook will begin to change. Your mind will become alert and observant. Your confidence and assurance will be enhanced. Your faith will be solidified." A holy Temple in the Lord. The new humanity that the Cross of Christ and the power of the Spirit produces is a new “holy temple in the Lord” (2:21). We are this new temple “in which God lives by his Spirit” (4:22). The temple is significant throughout Scripture.

The Temple in Jerusalem was not only the religious heart of the nation, and the place of pilgrimage of the Jews throughout the world.

It was also the political, social, musical and cultural heart of Jerusalem—as well as the place of celebration and feasting.

The reason for all of this was, of course, that Israel’s God, YHWH, had promised to live there. It was, many believed,

the place where earth and heaven met. But now (in Ephesians 2:19-22) Paul is declaring that the living God is constructing a new Temple. It consists, not of stones, arches, pillars and altars, but of human beings.

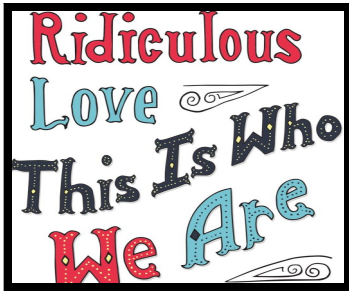

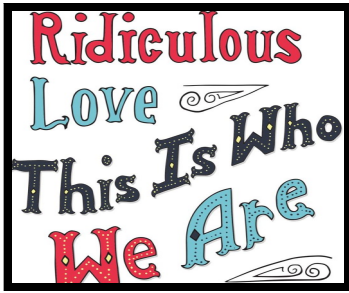

Week Seven: We are Loved

Multiple times in Ephesians Paul breaks out in prayer. The first three chapters of Ephesians are filled with worship (1:3-14—this is what God has done!) and prayer (1:15-23; 3:14-21—this is what God can do!). Paul's prayer in **Ephesians 3:14-21** is a prayer for these young churches to live in the power and the love of God. The identity of the Christ-follower is ultimately grounded in the love of Christ.

Ephesians 1-3

One of the most important things to do when studying Scripture is to read the passage through many, many times and to also read it in its context (what comes before and after the passage). Each week we will look at a section from Ephesians 1-3 but first we need to read the whole thing in one sitting. Don't Panic: It's only three chapters. As you read look for:

**Repeated words and phrases. What the passage tells you about God. Commands. Promises.
What the passage tells you about yourself.**

Sometimes it helps to use different colored highlighters or markings to put next to repeated words or ideas. You can also make lists in the margin. You will want to read the passage through at least three times. The first time, read quickly and just take it all in. The second and third time take it slowly and circle/highlight words and make your list! [iPad Users: Use the margin to write your notes but you may find it best to just print out the passage!]

Ephesians 1

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, To God's holy people in Ephesus, the faithful in Christ Jesus:² Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

³ Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. ⁴ For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love ⁵ he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will— ⁶ to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves. ⁷ In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace ⁸ that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and understanding, ⁹ he made known to us the mystery of his will according to his good pleasure, which he purposed in Christ, ¹⁰ to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfillment—to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ.

¹¹ In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, ¹² in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory. ¹³ And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴ who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory.

¹⁵ For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, ¹⁶ I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. ¹⁷ I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. ¹⁸ I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, ¹⁹ and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength ²⁰ he

exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms,²¹ far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that is invoked, not only in the present age but also in the one to come.²² And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church,²³ which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

Ephesians 2

As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins,² in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient.³ All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath.⁴ But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy,⁵ made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved.⁶ And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus,⁷ in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus.⁸ For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—⁹ not by works, so that no one can boast.¹⁰ For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

¹¹ Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called "uncircumcised" by those who call themselves "the circumcision" (which is done in the body by human hands)—¹² remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world.¹³ But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

¹⁴ For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility,¹⁵ by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace,¹⁶ and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility.¹⁷ He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near.¹⁸ For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

¹⁹ Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household,²⁰ built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone.²¹ In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord.²² And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

Ephesians 3

For this reason I, Paul, the prisoner of Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles—

²Surely you have heard about the administration of God's grace that was given to me for you, ³that is, the mystery made known to me by revelation, as I have already written briefly. ⁴In reading this, then, you will be able to understand my insight into the mystery of Christ, ⁵which was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed by the Spirit to God's holy apostles and prophets. ⁶This mystery is that through the gospel the Gentiles are heirs together with Israel, members together of one body, and sharers together in the promise in Christ Jesus.

⁷I became a servant of this gospel by the gift of God's grace given me through the working of his power. ⁸Although I am less than the least of all the Lord's people, this grace was given me: to preach to the Gentiles the boundless riches of Christ, ⁹and to make plain to everyone the administration of this mystery, which for ages past was kept hidden in God, who created all things. ¹⁰His intent was that now, through the church, the manifold wisdom of God should be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly realms, ¹¹according to his eternal purpose that he accomplished in Christ Jesus our Lord. ¹²In him and through faith in him we may approach God with freedom and confidence. ¹³I ask you, therefore, not to be discouraged because of my sufferings for you, which are your glory.

¹⁴For this reason I kneel before the Father, ¹⁵from whom every family in heaven and on earth derives its name. ¹⁶I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, ¹⁷so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, ¹⁸may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, ¹⁹and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

²⁰Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, ²¹to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.
