GROUP LIFE - AN INTRODUCTION

Welcome to community. We are made for life together but life together can get messy so here are some suggestions to make the time in your group fun, vulnerable and life-changing.

BE ATTENTIVE

We live in a loud, distracted world full of social media, text messaging and selfies. For the short time in your group, silence your phone and put it away. When someone is sharing, lean in to listen and ask questions. When you share, keep on topic and seek to be concise so that others can also share. Avoid interrupting or dominating the conversation. We want to learn from one another and we learn the most when we listen.

COME PREPARED

The emphasis of this time is to know God and to grow in our life with Him. When everyone does the homework, the discussion promises to be rich and deep. Pray before you come, anticipating what God will do in and through your group.

WHAT GROUP TIME IS AND IS NOT

A healthy group creates a safe place to be vulnerable, and confident that what is shared will not leave the group or be received with judgment. This is a time to grow in love for God and for one another. This is not a time to fix one another or give unsolicited advice.

Give feedback that is: affirming (thanks for trusting us with your story), empathetic (I've done the same thing) and attentive (can you say more about how that made you feel?).

Avoid feedback that is: condemning (oh my, I have never heard of anyone doing that), counseling/fixing (you should . . . have you tried . . . you need to stop . . .) or all about you (that reminds me of when I . . .). Also be careful about encouragement that is given too soon. When someone suffers pain or deep loss it's not the time to say that it will all be okay, God has a plan or that this has happened to you and it served an amazing purpose in your life. Usually it's best to just say, "I'm so sorry. That is so hard."

GET TO KNOW YOUR GROUP

We encourage connection outside your group time! Grab coffee, go for walks, talk, pray, check-in with one another. The work God is doing doesn't stop once you leave your group, and even a simple text of encouragement can be exactly what someone needs in the middle of a messy week.

USING THIS GUIDE

Studying Genesis for Biblical understanding and life-change.

Here's how to get the most out of your time:

SEEK GOD

God is the focus of our study. The intent of the author of Genesis is to put the beauty and hope of God on display as he shows the mess humanity created through misplaced worship and disobedience.

Settle into your study each day and pause to acknowledge God's presence with you. Do this again when you gather with your group to share what you are learning, experiencing and practicing.

Expect God to be present. Christian spirituality is entering into the reality that God is always present, always seeing, always hearing, always knowing and always moving toward us.

SET A PLACE AND A TIME, FIVE DAYS A WEEK

Right now, determine when and where you will meet with God. Put it on your calendar. Guard this time like you guard time for your favorite person, event or show. Each week is divided into five days of studying and practicing the truths of Genesis. Be sure to set aside 20-30 minutes each day.

GATHER TOGETHER

Gather some friends to meet with weekly to discuss how you are experiencing God, His word and life-change through your study of Genesis. Pray for each other. Listen to each other. Make it a safe time by not trying to fix one another with unsolicited advice. Be sure to be fully present with each other, knowing that God is fully present with you.

EXPECT CHANGE

When we come to faith in Jesus Christ a miracle takes place. God, the Holy Spirit, comes to live in us. Jesus told His followers that His Father would send the Holy Spirit to be with them and <u>in</u> them (John 14:17). The Holy Spirit is committed to our transformation—He instructs us with truth, He convicts us against unrighteousness, He empowers us for the mission of God and He grows us in fruitfulness (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control).

FOLLOW THE TEACHING



A PREVIEW OF EACH WEEK

This study is meant to change us. It's possible to study the Bible and change our mind but not our life—and this is a travesty. The work of God is not just a work of information but always, and primarily, a work of transformation. In *The Good and Beautiful God: Falling in Love with the God Jesus Knows*, James Bryan Smith says that one reason we don't change and experience the fruit of God's Spirit is that "we are not training" nor have we been taught "a reliable pattern of transformation." He says:

We cannot change simply by saying, "I want to change." We have to examine what we think (our narratives—false and true), how we practice spiritual disciplines (soul-training exercises) and who we are interacting with (our social context, the positive and negative pressure of peers). If we change these things—and we can—then change will come naturally to us. This is why Jesus said his "yoke" is easy. If we think the things He thought, do the things He did and spend time with like-minded people, we will be like Him, and it will not be difficult . . . I believe there is a reliable method of changing our hearts. It is not complicated, nor is it difficult. It does not rely on willpower. We begin with the triangle of transformation. It involves four basic elements: (1) changing the stories in our minds, (2) engaging in new practices (3) in reflection and dialogue with others who are on the same path, (4) all under the leading of the Holy Spirit.

THE TRIANGLE OF TRANSFORMATION



These four components of transformation guide us each week as we study Genesis.

Day One to Three—Scripture: Adopting the Narratives of Jesus

On the first three days we take it all in. We read Genesis, make general observations and answer questions that deepen our understanding and shape our lives. We always consider the false narratives we live by and allow Scripture to change those narratives to gospel, God-informed narratives. Remember, the Old Testament is the Bible Jesus read, so as we inform our minds with the truth of the Bible we are indeed adopting the mind of Christ.

Day Four—Gospel: Adopting the Narratives of Jesus

We are gospel people, reading the entire Bible through the lens of what Jesus accomplished in his life, death, resurrection and ascension back to the Father. On day four we connect the study of Genesis to redemptive history and gospel truth. The word gospel could be translated, "lifealtering good news" and the truth of Jesus is indeed, life-altering good news!

Day Five—Life: Engaging in Soul-Training Exercises by the Power of the Holy Spirit

On this day we intentionally move the truth from our head and heart to our life. We will practice soul-training exercises that can be adopted daily or weekly for the rest of our life. As we train, we cooperate with the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit who works in us and upon us to produce the fruit that is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control.

Grace is God acting in our lives to do things we can't do on our own.

Grace is not opposed to effort; it's opposed to earning.



GENESIS: AN OVERVIEW

The Beauty | The Mess | The Hope

Genesis means beginnings, and the first book of the Bible is chock-full of beginnings. In the beginning is **beauty:** God, heaven, land, sea, stars, moons, men, women, image-bearers, creatures that crawl, creatures that fly, creatures that swim, worship, obedience, relationship, purpose, love, marriage, food, plants, work, play, rest, commands, freedom and so much more. Genesis also records the beginning of a giant **mess:** sin, hiding, fear, shame, murder, suffering, polygamy, conflict, selfishness, disobedience, destruction, lying, cheating, stealing and more. But there is **hope:** hope that suffering will one day end; hope that humans and creation will live in the fullness of their purpose; and ultimately, hope for a Rescuer to make all things new.

This Study Guide is the first in a three part series on the book of Genesis. Throughout all three studies, we look at the themes of beauty, mess and hope. In this first study, the emphasis is on the beauty because in the beginning, our beautiful God creates beautiful things.

Reading Genesis Without Losing Your Mind or Your Faith

Genesis comes with some challenges: Is God okay with polygamy back then, but not now? Is the creation account an utter denial of science? If Abraham is a hero of the faith, why does he keep telling his wife to lie? All good questions! To answer these questions we need to understand the following principles of biblical study.

Genre

Genesis is considered by conservative theologians to be primarily historical narrative. It's always important to know the genre of the book or passage that we study to increase the probability of a right interpretation. Some will argue that Genesis 1-11 is myth and that Genesis 12-50 is historical narrative but, in our opinion, that understanding comes with quite a few problems.

We believe Adam and Eve are literal humans who, by God's providential selection, serve as representative humanity and therefore their sin corrupts all humanity. This is the position of Paul in Romans 5:6-21. As you read this passage (page 10), notice that sin entered the world through one man, Adam, just as righteousness was graced to us through one man, Jesus. Some say it's unfair that the consequence of sin was placed upon all humanity because of Adam's sin, but we must consider these two questions:

- 1. If this is unfair, shall we also reject the grace of God since it too is unfair and undeserved?
- 2. Would any of us do better than Adam at remaining perfectly righteous?

- ⁶ For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. ⁷ For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die—
 ⁸ but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. ⁹ Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. ¹⁰ For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life.
- ¹¹ More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation. ¹² Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned—¹³ for sin indeed was in the world before the law was given, but sin is not counted where there is no law.
 - ¹⁴ Yet death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sinning was not like the transgression of Adam, who was a type of the one who was to come.
 - ¹⁵ But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if many died through one man's trespass, much more have the grace of God and the free gift by the grace of that one man Jesus Christ abounded for many. ¹⁶ And the free gift is not like the result of that one man's sin.
- For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brought justification. ¹⁷ For if, because of one man's trespass, death reigned through that one man, much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man Jesus Christ.
- ¹⁸ Therefore, as one trespass led to condemnation for all men, so one act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all men. ¹⁹ For as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.
- ²⁰Now the law came in to increase the trespass, but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, ²¹ so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through righteousness leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Romans 5:6-21

In narrative, the author's intent is mostly revealed in true stories rather than direct statements. To correctly interpret narrative, we must study its whole (first read the whole book) and the whole of each story (first read the whole chapter or chapters). This means reading all of Genesis before reading Abraham's story and then reading all of Abraham's story before we dissect it verse by verse. No one critically studies a Harry Potter book without first reading it all the way through—and they'd be wise to first read the entire collection.

So, we'll go through Genesis chapter by chapter, but we'll also jump ahead (and back) to take in the grand scope of the narrative and important themes such as the sovereignty of God, redemptive history, covenant, blessing, grace, mission, the chaos and corruption of sin and the rescue plan of God. It will serve your study to read Genesis through in one sitting (or two).

Note that throughout Genesis the genre of poetry also appears. This is important when interpreting Genesis 1, which has the structure of a poem (more accurately described by theologian C. John Collins as, "exalted prose narrative"). Poems are meant to show and emote.

Genesis 1 <u>shows</u> us that God is creator and all that He creates is good, even very good. Genesis 1 also causes us to <u>feel</u> the beauty of God and His creation, as we are invited to worship the God who powerfully and personally speaks creation into being and does so with purpose.

Creation and Science

Genesis is disturbing to some because they read it to be in conflict with science. They read Genesis 1 and conclude that our earth is much younger than science suggests or they conclude that science trumps the seven-day creation of the universe and its inhabitants. All of this is widely debated and we will not say where you ought to fall in the debate, but here are two things to consider:

- 1. Authorial Intent—Every Biblical author has an intent. This is why we believe all Scripture has one true meaning but many applications. The one true meaning is what the author intended it to mean, not what we think or feel it means. This is the reason for rigorous and humble study of Scripture. Because the author of Genesis 1 uses a form of poetry, exalted prose narrative, we read this chapter through that lens and it appears the author's intent was not to write a scientific proof of creation. Genesis 1 is a theological hymn with the emphasis on who-created the universe (and why-He created) not exactly how it all came to be. God is clearly the subject and the initiator (35 times). God created, said, made, called, saw, set, blessed, finished, and rested. And what God does is affirmed as good (8 times) and ultimately very good.

HEROES OF THE FAITH AND POLYGAMY

Science isn't the only thing that causes us to question Genesis. Lots of people get tripped up over the prolific polygamy and the messed up lives of the so-called heroes of our faith. Lamech marries two women. Abraham makes his wife lie. Jacob manipulates his birthright. Joseph begins as an arrogant, spoiled daddy's boy.

But the Bible is not a book about people to emulate, it's about the one true God to worship. When we read Genesis looking for heroes, proclaiming "be like Abraham" or "be like Isaac" we miss the point. This is a critical point: Genesis tells the true story of broken men and women—who God works in and through—despite their flaws. Genesis is a book about the grace of God, not the goodness of humanity.

But, what about Hebrews 11? The people in Hebrews 11 are often called the heroes of our faith. This is a misunderstanding of the chapter. The purpose of Hebrews 11 is to put faith on display, not people. The point is not to put Abraham on a pedestal but to put his <u>faith</u> on a pedestal. <u>Do not</u> imitate Abraham's lack of faith when he hijacks God's plan by having sex with his servant

in hopes of producing an heir in his own timing. But, <u>do</u> imitate his faith when he obeys God's call to go to a land He will later reveal. The author of Hebrews wants us to see what faith looks like by highlighting these historical moments in the lives of men and women.

Tim Keller offers insight on this as well as the issue of polygamy. He says:

Many years ago, when I first started reading the Book of Genesis, it was very upsetting to me. Here are all these spiritual heroes—Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph—and look at how they treat women. They engage in polygamy, and they buy and sell their wives. It was awful to read their stories at times. But then I read Robert Alter's, The Art of Biblical Narrative. Alter is a Jewish scholar at Berkeley whose expertise is ancient Jewish literature. In his book he says there are two institutions present in the Book of Genesis that were universal in ancient cultures: polygamy and primogeniture. Polygamy said a husband could have multiple wives, and primogeniture said the oldest son got everything—all the power, all the money. In other words, the oldest son basically ruled over everyone else in the family. Alter points out that when you read the Book of Genesis, you'll see two things. First of all, in every generation polygamy wreaks havoc. Having multiple wives is an absolute disaster socially, culturally, spiritually, emotionally, psychologically, and relationally. Second, when it comes to primogeniture, in every generation God favors the younger son over the older. He favors Abel, not Cain; Isaac, not Ishmael; Jacob, not Esau. Alter says that you begin to realize what the Book of Genesis is doing—it is subverting, not supporting, those ancient institutions at every turn.

GENESIS 1-3

1 In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. ²The earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters.

³ And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. ⁴ And God saw that the light was good. And God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

⁶ And God said, "Let there be an expanse in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters." ⁷ And God made the expanse and separated the waters that were under the expanse from the waters that were above the expanse. And it was so. ⁸ And God called the expanse Heaven. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

⁹ And God said, "Let the waters under the heavens be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. ¹⁰ God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good.

¹¹ And God said, "Let the earth sprout vegetation, plants yielding seed, and fruit trees bearing fruit in which is their seed, each according to its kind, on the earth." And it was so. ¹² The earth brought forth vegetation, plants yielding seed according to their own kinds, and trees bearing fruit in which is their seed, each according to its kind. And God saw that it was good. ¹³ And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.

¹⁴And God said, "Let there be lights in the expanse of the heavens to separate the day from the night. And let them be for signs and for seasons, and for days and years, ¹⁵and let them be lights in the expanse of the heavens to give light upon the earth." And it was so. ¹⁶And God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night—and the stars. ¹⁷And God set them in the expanse of the heavens to give light on the earth, ¹⁸to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. ¹⁹And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.

²⁰ And God said, "Let the waters swarm with swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the expanse of the heavens." So God created the great sea creatures and every living creature that moves, with which the waters swarm, according to their kinds, and every winged bird according to its kind. And God saw that it was good. And God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day.

²⁴And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures according to their kinds—livestock and creeping things and beasts of the earth according to their kinds." And it was so. ²⁵And God made the beasts of the earth according to their kinds and the livestock according to their kinds, and everything that creeps on the ground according to its kind. And God saw that it was good.

²⁶Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. And let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth."

²⁷ So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

²⁸ And God blessed them. And God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth." ²⁹ And God said, "Behold, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is on the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit. You shall have them for food. ³⁰ And to every beast of the earth and to every bird of the heavens and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. ³¹ And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.

2 Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all the host of them. ² And on the seventh day God finished his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work that he had done. ³ So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it God rested from all his work that he had done in creation.

⁴These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created, in the day that the LORD God made the earth and the heavens.

⁵When no bush of the field was yet in the land and no small plant of the field had yet sprung up—for the LORD God had not caused it to rain on the land, and there was no man to work the ground, ⁶ and a mist was going up from the land and was watering the whole face of the ground—⁷ then the LORD God formed the man of dust from the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living creature. ⁸ And the LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and there he put the man whom he had formed. ⁹ And out of the ground the LORD God made to spring up every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food. The tree of life was in the midst

of the garden, and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

¹⁰ A river flowed out of Eden to water the garden, and there it divided and became four rivers. ¹¹ The name of the first is the Pishon. It is the one that flowed around the whole land of Havilah, where there is gold. ¹² And the gold of that land is good; bdellium and onyx stone are there. ¹³ The name of the second river is the Gihon. It is the one that flowed around the whole land of Cush. ¹⁴ And the name of the third river is the Tigris, which flows east of Assyria. And the fourth river is the Euphrates.

¹⁵The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to work it and keep it. ¹⁶And the LORD God commanded the man, saying, "You may surely eat of every tree of the garden, ¹⁷ but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die."

¹⁸Then the LORD God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." ¹⁹Now out of the ground the LORD God had formed every beast of the field and every bird of the heavens and brought them to the man to see what he would call them. And whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name. ²⁰The man gave names to all livestock and to the birds of the heavens and to every beast of the field. But for Adam there was not found a helper fit for him. ²¹ So the LORD God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and while he slept took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. ²² And the rib that the LORD God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. ²³ Then the man said,

"This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man."

²⁴Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh. ²⁵ And the man and his wife were both naked and were not ashamed.

3 Now the serpent was more crafty than any other beast of the field that the LORD God had made.

He said to the woman, "Did God actually say, 'You shall not eat of any tree in the garden'?" ² And the woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden, ³ but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the midst of the garden, neither shall you touch it, lest you die.'" ⁴ But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not surely die. ⁵ For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing

good and evil." ⁶ So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate, and she also gave some to her husband who was with her, and he ate. ⁷ Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked. And they sewed fig leaves together and made themselves loincloths.

⁸ And they heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden. 9 But the LORDGod called to the man and said to him, "Where are you?" 10 And he said, "I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked, and I hid myself." 11 He said, "Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten of the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?" 12 The man said, "The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit of the tree, and $\ensuremath{\mathsf{I}}$ ate." 13 Then the LORD God said to the woman, "What is this that you have done?" The woman said, "The serpent deceived me, and I ate."

¹⁴ The LORD God said to the serpent,

"Because you have done this, cursed are you above all livestock and above all beasts of the field; on your belly you shall go, and dust you shall eat all the days of your life.

¹⁵I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head,

and you shall bruise his heel."

¹⁶To the woman he said,

"I will surely multiply your pain in childbearing; in pain you shall bring forth children.

Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, but he shall rule over you."

¹⁷ And to Adam he said,

"Because you have listened to the voice of your wife and have eaten of the tree

of which I commanded you,

'You shall not eat of it,'

cursed is the ground because of you; in pain you shall eat of it all the days of your life; 18 thorns and thistles it shall bring forth for you; and you shall eat the plants of the field.
19 By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread,
till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken;
for you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

 20 The man called his wife's name Eve, because she was the mother of all living. 21 And the LORD God made for Adam and for his wife garments of skins and clothed them.

²²Then the LORD God said, "Behold, the man has become like one of us in knowing good and evil. Now, lest he reach out his hand and take also of the tree of life and eat, and live forever—" ²³ therefore the LORD God sent him out from the garden of Eden to work the ground from which he was taken. ²⁴ He drove out the man, and at the east of the garden of Eden he placed the cherubim and a flaming sword that turned every way to guard the way to the tree of life.

DAY FOUR—GOSPEL: ADOPTING THE NARRATIVES OF JESUS

The whole Bible speaks to the Gospel—the life-altering good news of Jesus. His life, work, words, and provision for salvation and intimacy with God. This good news shapes how we think and live. Today we look at the New Testament parallels to Genesis 1-3. Yes, we have to go all the way to chapter 3!

Read Genesis 1-3 alongside John 1:1-18, 29-34 and record the parallels you discover. Look for similar words and themes such as beginning, light, creation, God's presence with us, sin, etc.

Only human beings are said to be made in the image of God . . . and (therefore) it is clear that we have a closer relationship to God than any other creature. The metaphor of image means "reflection" or a "small scale copy". This means we are like God: He is not wholly other and mysterious. At the same time it means we are not God . . . Most importantly, image contains the seed of the idea of (Biblical) sonship. Just as children are born in the image of their parents (Genesis 5:1-3), so we are called to be His children.

"It may be possible for each to think too much of his own potential glory hereafter; (but) it is hardly possible for him to think too often or too deeply about that of his neighbor. The load, or weight, or burden of my neighbor's glory should be laid daily on my back, a load so heavy that only humility can carry it, and the backs of the proud will be broken . . . There are no ordinary people. You have never talked to a mere mortal . . . it is immortals whom we joke with, work with, marry, snub and exploit . . . Next to the Blessed Sacrament itself, your neighbor is the holiest object presented to your senses."

THE BEAUTY OF WORK

DAY ONE—SCRIPTURE: ADOPTING THE NARRATIVES OF JESUS

Genesis shows the beauty of humanity and why we give dignity to all people: the rich and the poor, the powerful and the weak, the young and the old. Genesis also shows the beauty of work. Often we see work as a result of the fall, but work was on display at the very beginning. God worked! Genesis 2:2 says, "And on the seventh day, God finished his work, that he had done . . ."

Tim Keller says, "Some Greeks believed that gods created humanity to do the hard labor they found too demeaning... The physical was considered demeaning, while the immaterial and the spiritual were considered good. (So) in Greek thought, work was a necessary evil (and) one should aspire to be as free from it as possible. In complete contradiction to that view, we have Genesis 1-2. Here is a God who works, in fact, He puts in a full week like everyone else. So we learn here that work has dignity because it is something God does."

Idolatry as inordinate affection: loving ourselves or others or things more than God (and it) always bends us out of shape.

Day Two—Scripture: Adopting the Narratives of Jesus Read Genesis 2:1-3. List all that God did on the seventh day. How does Genesis 1:31 set up the seventh day (Genesis 2:1-3) and why is this significant as we imitate God's rest?

Meditate upon these words and, along with Scripture, let them shape your prayer today.

Un-sabbathed, our work becomes the entire context in which we define our lives. We lose God-consciousness, God-awareness, sightings of resurrection. We lose the capacity to sing "This is my Father's world" and end up chirping little self-centered ditties about what we are doing and feeling. This is a most difficult command to keep, a most difficult practice to cultivate. It is one of the most abused and distorted practices of the Christian life. Many through the centuries have suffered much under oppressive Sabbath regimes . . . Jesus spent a good deal of His time at odds with people who had wrong ideas about keeping Sabbath . . . But I don't see any way out of it: if we are going to live appropriately in the creation we must keep the Sabbath. We must stop running around long enough to see what God has done and is doing. We must shut up long enough to hear what He has said and is saying. All our ancestors agree that without silence and stillness there is no spirituality, no God-attentive, God-responsive life.

Sabbath is the time set aside to do nothing so that we can receive everything, to set aside our anxious attempts to make ourselves useful, to set aside our tense restlessness, to set aside our media-satiated boredom. Sabbath is the time to receive silence and let it deepen into gratitude, to receive quiet into which forgotten faces and voices unobtrusively make themselves present, to receive the days of the just completed week and absorb the wonder and miracle still reverberating from each one, to receive our Lord's amazing grace.

DAY TWO—SCRIPTURE: ADOPTING THE NARRATIVES OF JESUS

The only thing "not good" in Genesis 1-2 is the aloneness of man. Tim Keller says, "The term 'image' makes it clear that human beings are made for relationships. This makes loneliness a problem for any human being . . . What is extremely interesting is the implication that Adam's relationship with God is not, in itself, enough! Adam is without sin and therefore has an unimpeded relationship with God. Nothing blocks his fellowship with the Father, yet his aloneness is substantial. That means that Adam's relationship needs and capacity are such that even a relationship with God himself is not sufficient to satisfy him."

What about singleness? Read 1 Corinthians 7 and record how this passage puts marriage in perspective for those single and married.

Tim Keller on the Importance of Marriage as Covenant and One Flesh

The word 'cleave' (Gen. 2:24, sometimes translated 'hold fast to' or 'is united to') means to unite to someone through a covenant, a binding promise or oath. This is the missing piece in contemporary thinking. In our individualistic society, the legality of marriage seems inconsequential (just a piece of paper — what matters is that we love each other). But, the Bible insists on a public act of social accountability. A covenant was always enacted through a ceremony before witnesses. Genesis 2:22-25 is in fact the first marriage ceremony, in which God, himself, like a father of the bride, leads the woman to the man . . . Despite the rhetoric (we don't need a piece of paper to love each other), a binding public oath is actually an enormous act of love in and of itself . . . The willingness to make a binding covenant is a test that your love for each other is marriage-level. Scripture intends that marriage, as a covenant, is a permanent union . . . The husband and wife are also to be one flesh (Gen. 2:24). This refers to the personal union of man and woman at all levels of their lives which is expressed in, and deepened through, their sexual relationship. Most commentators agree that the phrase includes sex but is more all-encompassing. The purpose of sexuality, then, is to be a visible expression of the complete unity that should be happening in the rest of the marriage . . . The covenant made (shall cleave to his wife) is then regularly renewed (shall be one flesh). Covenant renewal is enormously important in the Bible. The book of Deuteronomy is a long renewal of the covenant of Sinai. The Lord's Supper is a regular, ceremonial renewal of the covenant of baptism. Sex physically expresses the oneness created by the marriage covenant in all other areas of married life (financially, legally, emotionally, personally, psychologically). Sex renews and revitalizes the marriage covenant . . . The implications relevant to our culture include: (1) Sex is clearly good, God-created and a requisite part of marriage; and (2) If sex is linked to covenant and is given for the purpose of symbolizing, deepening and renewing a covenant commitment, it needs the context of a covenant commitment (marriage)!

DAY FOUR—GOSPEL: ADOPTING THE NARRATIVES OF JESUS

Read Genesis 1:27-28 and 2:15-18. What specifically was the woman created to help with? How does this disrupt some conservative teaching and some liberal teaching on the role of women?

Sixteen times the word *helper* (ezer) is used in the Old Testament to refer to God when a savior or protector was needed against an enemy. How is this significant to Eve's role in Genesis 2:16-18?

How has Jesus come to help and protect you (1 John 2:1-2; Hebrews 2:14-18; John 10:7-18)?

Tim Keller on Women as "Helpers"

The English word 'helper' is, unfortunately, a rather weak word. It connotes an 'assistant'—someone less capable who runs errands and does menial tasks. However, almost every other time the Hebrew word ezer is used in the Bible, it describes God Himself. As we use the word 'help' for God, we see that it means 'providing what is lacking in the one who needs help.' In this biblical sense, a helper is someone who helps out of strength, yet in a supportive way. For example, what does it mean for a parent to help her child with his math homework? The word 'help' implies two things: (1) It means that the helper is more capable in something than the one being helped. You can help with math if (and only if!) you do math better than your child; and (2) it means that you use your power in a way that enables and supports. You are not 'helping' your child with his homework if you actually do the work for him. You must not usurp his responsibility but use your power in a way that enriches, supports and 'empowers' him . . . The text contradicts both very traditional and very feminist views. On the one hand, it teaches that women are not inferior to men. If to be a 'help' is to be inferior, then God is inferior to us, for he is our help! In order to be a help to men, women must somehow be stronger. Yet, on the other hand, it teaches that there must be some ways that the genders are irreducibly different. There must be some things that women can do better than men. And, by way of implication, there must be some things that men can do better than women . . . The other word in verse 18's phrase, ezer kenegdo (helper suitable, NIV) means someone who 'fits' as a 'counterpart.' There is a sense of a complementary, irreplaceable companion" . . . One implication of this text is that we need (even apart from marriage) the friendship and fellowship of persons of the opposite sex—whether siblings and relatives, Christian brothers and sisters, or just friends. There are always ways in which we need the stretching and enriching experience of cross-gender friendships. There are things you can only learn (either through counsel or example) from people of the other gender. We must not think that we have to be married for this enrichment to take place.

DAY FIVE—SOUL-TRAINING EXERCISES BY THE POWER OF THE SPIRIT

Lectio Divina: Ephesians 5:21-33

Follow this guide from Richard Foster to practice Lectio Divina (Spiritual Reading).

Listening

Read the passage (Ephesians 5:21-33) all the way through without pausing – sometimes it's helpful to read out loud. Then read the passage again – this time pause, underline words, highlight a phrase. Take time to note what seems to be jumping off the page into your heart and mind.

Reflecting

Once you find a word or a phrase that strikes you, spend time reflecting upon it. Ponder it in your mind and heart. Ask: How are You revealing yourself to me, Lord? What am I to see and understand as my life merges with Yours?

Praying

Listening and reflecting naturally turns to conversation with God. Engage with what you are hearing by praying this Scripture and letting this holy moment with God give rise to your heart's cry of gratitude, confession, lament, relief, or praise. Record your prayer here.

Obeying

Here we contemplate the meaning of this word from God—for the choices we will make this day, for the attitudes we will carry into our tasks, for the thoughts we will allow to dwell uppermost in our mind. What is God calling you to as you pray through this passage? If you are married, is there a courageous, encouraging or healing conversation you need to have with your spouse?

Here we see that the law of God is a gift of grace that is the foundation of human flourishing. It is not "busywork" assigned just to please the arbitrary whims of a capricious deity. The law of God simply shows us what human beings were built to do—to worship God alone, to love their neighbors as themselves, to tell the truth, keep their promises, forgive everything, act with justice. When we move against these laws we move against our own natures and happiness. Disobedience to God sets up strains in the fabric of reality that can only lead to break down.
